




The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) makes funds available through the Wisconsin Department of Administration, Division of Housing, for PATH programs in Wisconsin.

Outreach and case management services are provided face-to-face in the community to engage people living with mental illness and/or co-occurring disorders who are homeless. The PATH Program works with area agencies to provide on-site resources and support for people affected by mental illness and/or substance abuse. The outreach worker assists people to connect with appropriate mental health and substance abuse services available to them through KHDS Mental Health and Substance Abuse Resource Center.

The PATH program provides funds for flexible community-based services to individuals living with serious mental illnesses and those with co-occurring substance use disorders (serious mental illness and substance abuse disorders) and who are generally literally homeless or to a lesser extent at imminent risk of becoming homeless. To be eligible for PATH funding, the individuals served must meet both criteria.

The PATH program provides services designed for homeless individuals that are not available through mainstream service systems including outreach, engagement, enrollment, and other PATH-eligible services. Priority is given to those people with the greatest need, i.e., persons who are literally homeless and who were previously unknown to or not engaged in the mental health system.

PATH Eligible Services:

- · outreach
- screening and diagnostic services
- community mental health services
- alcohol or drug treatment services
- case management services
- technical assistance in applying for housing assistance
- staff training, including training of individuals who work in shelters, mental health clinics, substance abuse programs, and other sites where homeless individuals require services
- referrals for primary health services, job training, educational services, and relevant housing services
- improving the coordination of housing services
